I. Welcome and Introduction

Bruce Coon chaired the meeting. Attendees introduced themselves and identified the agencies they represented. There were 22 attendees at this meeting.

III. FRC Coordinators' Updates

1. FACT Center - Mary Morris

- 100 families currently being served with 10 families on waiting list.
- Clinics were held May 3 & 4 at the FACT Center, in collaboration with Clinicas, for enrolling kindergarteners which provided 16 children with Dental exams and 22 children with Physicals/Immunization. Healthy Families and Medical information was also given to the adults.
- Clinicas has agreed to hold another dental clinic May 23, 8:30 a.m.-10:00 a.m. due to overwhelming amount of calls for dental screenings.

5. Brawley FRC – Rita Duarte

- Drug & Alcohol Counseling – students receive credits for attending sessions- currently 50 minutes long – goal for next year is to add an after-school component lengthening the time to 90 minutes. Currently 51 students are enrolled.
- 20 successful graduates from Parenting Classes
- Social Services available to assist with Minor Consent Forms

IV. Other Agency Updates

1. Alejandro Gayton – ICBHS reported that the Mental Health Service Act Plan had been approved with the following allocations \$1.3 million for 2006-07 and \$1.8 million for 2007-08. The funds will be used for working with transitional youth and adults with MH issues to improve their success and support on release from incarceration; mobile unit support for 60+ year olds with mental disorders; and community outreach expanded to outlying areas.

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2. Denise Morris- March of Dimes reported that the last walk event raised \$11,000 locally. March of Dimes recently awarded Clinicas \$75,000 in funding for providing training in five local clinics. In recent years, Valley programs are actually getting more than what is raised locally.
3. David Wise-DSS reported that the Foster Care Parent Symposium and Recognition event will be May 11th.
4. Mercy S. Patterson – ICBH/Children Services reported that childrens services are being provided from the three satelite clinics at the Calexico, San Pasqual and FACT FRCs.
5. Bruce Coon –ICPHD reported that California Childrens Services programs saw a 20 to 25% increase in clients in their satelite clinics in Holtville, Heber, Seeley, Westmorland, and Calipatria. They will soon begin offering services in Imperial from the Old Imperial FRC.

V. ISC Coordinator/LCC Chair Updates

The ISC Coordinator Position will be advertised through May 21st. It is anticipated that interviews will occur the week of May 28. A new Coordinator could be in place as soon as July 1st. If you have questions in the meantime, call Student Well-Being for an appropriate referral.

The Social Host Ordinances are now being reviewed by most of the cities. The city of Calipatria had their second reading and adoption on May 8th. The City of Calexico has favorably discussed the ordinance and will have their first reading on May 15th. The City of Holtville had their first reading and favorable discussion of the ordinance on April 30th. Their second reading will be May 21st. The Brawley Police Chief is finalizing the staff work for presentation in Brawley. The El Centro Police Chief is reviewing the ordinance. The City of Imperial adopted the ordinance a year ago January. The next element of the process is to send information about the ordinance and alcohols impact on brain development to parents of high school students in each of the communities that has adopted the ordinance.

New Business

1. Report on Methamphetamine Impact on Casework, Practice and Policy in Imperial County by Gabe Vela, District Attorney's Office, and Claudia De Leon, DSS,

Gabe Vela is a DA Investigator serving on the IV Street Interdiction Team (SIT). He identified some of the local law enforcement teams dealing with methamphetamine: HIDTA, MMT, BIT, SIT, and NTF. (We have the distinction of having one of the oldest continuously operating HIDTAs or High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area units.) Our Port has the added distinction of being the third busiest drug crossing in the US. Meth related problems are growing and changing rapidly in our community. The change in US availability of raw materials for meth manufacturing has reduced the number of local meth labs. We are seeing fewer labs and more meth coming up from Mexico. Seizures at the port are up.

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Beyond the significant law enforcement efforts related to this issue there are significant efforts on behalf of drug endangered children. Claudia De Leon, DSS, reported they began testing all children of parents in drug cases during the last 18 months. About 75% of them are testing positive for drug exposure - often to multiple drugs (e.g. meth and marijuana). DSS is removing increasing numbers of children from parents.

In 2006, DSS had 1800 child abuse referrals. Through April in 2007, there have been 700. The meth child abuse referrals, most of which come from concerned neighbors, are often very specific beyond the house is filthy, the children are filthy, to the children are outside at 2:00 a.m. while the parent is inside straightening.

The District Attorney and DSS have developed and received Board of Supervisor approval for the DEC or Drug Endangered Children Program. Before the DEC Protocol can be implemented, all of the parties using DEC must be trained. They are working on bringing in the training for key players including all local law enforcement, emergency room physicians and nurses, DSS, and appropriate other school officials.

Gabe and Claudia provided details about meth seizures, addiction, and caseloads. They spoke about hospital policies regarding testing newborns and delivering moms for illegal drugs and the impact of Prop 36 and three strikes laws.

2. Facilitated LCC Discussion of Methamphetamine Issues The bottom line is that meth is an issue that is facing all law enforcement agencies and all human service agencies that deal with children and families. The question was asked: **What else can be recommended to address the meth issue in Imperial County?**

The consensus was that everyone addressing meth in Imperial County needs to be brought together. To maximize efficiency and to encourage participation, significant incentives are required. One of the incentives will be thorough research and preparation. We would like to compile data for all agencies that deal with meth related cases.

The plan needs a "Lead Person" who will request information from all involved agencies regarding their agencies' meth related arrests and results for 2004, 2005, and 2006. Law enforcement and other agencies currently use Penal Code numbers (rather than by categories of drugs) when inputting arrest case information in their databases. Individual Meth details at this time would probably require numerous hours of man power researching through each case record. We will have to start with the information that is currently available.

All available data needs to be submitted by June 15th to Michael McFadden, ICOE Director of Student Well-Being at mmcfadden@icoe.org or mailed to his attention at ICOE, 1398 Sperber Road, El Centro, CA (312-6498). The compiled data will be used by the Interagency Steering Committee to develop a workday, or ½ day, joining together all agencies to address meth issues and needs in Imperial County.
